


**THE ARMY NURSE IN WAR**



**A NURSE'S ROLE** - The recovery of this wounded hero is hastened by the chemical work of Second Lieutenant Helen Johnson, Army nurse of Duluth, Minnesota, as well as by the medical attention she is giving him at an Air Service Command hospital in Italy. Other Army nurses are caring for wounded American soldiers on every front, 130,000 more are needed.
